Bids from our board members and very generous auction attendees raised a total of \$3418.00 for

The new sign will be the same size as the original, but will be aluminum instead of bare wood, which should withstand outdoor conditions well. It will also have our school logo, name and phone number at the top (this picture is a very simple mockup, not what will actually be on the sign).

We anticipate having the new sign in place before the next school year begins. We are a little more than halfway to our goal of \$4800 and are trusting God to provide the rest.

ACSI Speech Meet

Our middle and high school students participated in the ACSI Speech Meet on April 12. The students competed against other students from 14 Christian schools. Categories included Bible Memorization and Application, Humorous Interpretation, Dramatic Interpretation, Duet Acting, Puppets and Interpretation of Children's Literature. Each student presented their piece twice before two different panels of judges and an audience. They are given scores ranging from 0-50 points, with rankings of Good (24-36 points), Excellent (37-44 points) and Superior (45-50 points).

Tenth grade students, Luke Moore (Humorous Int.) and

Josiah McCauslin (Children's Lit.) earned Superior ratings from the judges. Luke was selected to present his speech at the closing program that afternoon, which was the first time ACCA has ever been represented in that portion of the program. Eric Day (Bible Mem.) and Jacob Anderson and Shaylie Moore (Duet Acting) received Excellent ratings and Emma Anderson (Dramatic Int.), Wyatt Lamb, Makayla Keller and Kaitlyn Doud (Puppets) received Good ratings. All did a superb job sharing their God-given abilities with others. Congratulations to all!


So far this year, our fundraisers have raised a total of \$25,953.70. This has been a tremendous blessing to our budget and your participation has been much appreciated!
