

Challenge: The Mayflower has encountered heavy seas and all of their sand-glasses were shattered. These instruments are important because they are used to measure time and calibrate the speed and direction in which the ship is traveling. your challenge is to work as a team to create a new sandglass that can measure one minute of time using normal objects of today.

Family Referral Benefit

There is still time to take advantage of the Family Referral Benefit this year! If you know someone looking for a great school, point them our way!

Adams County Christian Academy is pleased to offer a referral benefit for 2018-2019 to our ACCA families for up to \$500. Families can receive this benefit by referring new students to our school.

Current ACCA families refer new students to ACCA. The new family must

complete the school's application, have their application approved and then register. At the time of application approval, a form advising which ACCA family referred them to our school will be completed. The current, referring ACCA family will receive the benefit in two payments. The first will be applied January 1, 2019 and the second payment will be applied on May 1, 2019.

Terms and Conditions:

If, for some reason, the referred student(s) do not complete the 2018-2019 school year or do not meet all financial obligations, the full referral benefit will not be distributed. If a new referred family enrolls more than one student, the referral benefit will be as follows:

 I^{st} child referral-\$500, 2^{nd} child referral-\$250, 3^{rd} child referral-\$125. (There is no referral benefit after the 3^{rd} child). If a current ACCA family is credited with referring more than one new family with more than one student the benefit would


Annual Christmas Chapel
